2020 – 21 Reunion – Finally a Reality

After COVID forced us to cancel our annual reunion – TWICE in 2020 and again in the spring of 2021, we are finally holding our 14th reunion on September 16, 17, 18, 2021.

We have to thank the Hilton Garden Inn – Columbus, Georgia for keeping our original room rates and catering costs the same as we originally negotiated over two years ago. There were no penalties imposed on us for cancelling, which could have happened according to the standard contract language in our agreement. But the Hilton Management understood our dilemma and waived all penalties and fines.

I know many folks planned to make the trip over to Fort Rucker to visit the Aviation Museum and the 121st monument that honors the 30 men who gave their lives while serving with the 93rd/121st. We also had planned a tour of Fort Benning, but the Department of Defense has still not opened the gates to “outsiders” to enter any military facilities. As of the date this is being written, civilians will not be able to get onto Fort Benning or Fort Rucker. Those of you with retired military ID cards may be able to get on to these bases, but I would advise that you call ahead to see what restrictions are in place.

(I have recently been informed that the National Infantry Museum will be open on Saturday and Sunday. Please check with the registration desk in the hospitality room if you plan to visit the museum.)

Our reunion this year will be like no other. When I checked a couple of weeks ago, the Hilton Hotels were requiring properly worn face masks in all the public areas. But advise everyone to be safe and take whatever precautions you feel comfortable with. The State of Georgia and the City of Columbus may have other restrictions in place at the time of our reunion. Based on my discussions with Amy from Texas Tech University’s Vietnam Center and Archive (TTUVCA), currently they will only store and provide data to researchers who come to their campus for items for which they do not have clear ownership. So, even though I have signed a “deed of gift” for each version of the 121st Avn. Assoc. Archive, they do not consider they have full ownership of every copyrighted item in our

archive. Therefore, my challenge is to get as many “deeds of gift” as I can from those of you who have given me their photos. This involves each of you, if you choose, to submit a “deed of gift” giving TTUVCA ownership. One of the best times to do this will be at our forthcoming reunion. I will be able to tell you how to identify your photos, and will collect and forward your “deeded of gift” to TTUVCA. So I will come equipped with lots of blank forms and, of course, my copy of the archive so that we will be able to correctly identify each of your photos.

Now as to why I am undertaking this task. I’m hopeful that if I get enough photos turned over to TTUVCA they will allow us to have on-line access to our archive. Allowing public access to our archive would be worthwhile for all. I recognize this will not be easy. Many of our guys have passed, so we will have to ask next of kin to sign. Actually, I have already done this. Ernie Miller’s sister has already signed and provided all Ernie’s negatives and back-up materials. Besides, I’m only eighty-five, so what’s the problem! In closing, I would like to express my thanks to Mike Law of the VHPA for helping me work on this task.
